The Incredible Immune System

During this season with so many colds and so much

flu going around, how can we even survive? We can because of our incredibly designed immune system. What a fantastic example of complex interrelationships and irreducible complexity which cannot be produced by accidents. Here is a simplified explanation of how it works.

When germs enter our blood stream and begin to reproduce, they need to be quickly recognized as such and eliminated. So first of all our immune system has to be able to recognize what is good and what is bad. Otherwise, it will eliminate what needs to be there.

In order to eliminate these "bad guys" (or "antigens," for those who like the technical stuff), your body needs to produce "germ-fighters" ("antibodies") with just the right shape to match the shape of the bad guys. If the antibody has the

right shape, then it will lock onto it. If not, hopefully another antibody does. The fit has to be just right in order to be able to lock onto and tie up the antigen. Fortunately, we have a tremendous number and diversity of antibodies; however, occasionally something new comes along for which our immune system has no perfect match. Then a remarkable thing occurs.

An antibody that has


a reasonably close fit ties up the antigen as well as possible and tries to eliminate it. Since it carries its factory with it, it sends a message to the factory to produce a bunch more just like it to provide the first wave of defense. But remember, what is being produced is not perfect for the job. It doesn't fit quite right, so it is inefficient. Now an amazing procedure is begun. The factory begins to produce a pile of alterations of the closest fit to try to make one with a perfect fit. This process can take a couple weeks but the final product of antibodies are perfectly tailored to fit the new germ. When it hits this right combination, it then produces a huge number of these to battle the bad guys. You

are then well into recovery from the illness and have the pattern on file for the next time this same type of germ comes along. Isn't immunity amazing?

> To sum up the key components, first the system requires an ability to recognize the bad guys from the good guys. Second, our system has to tolerate the good guys without destroying them along with the bad. (If something goes wrong here, the system goes bad such as in AIDS.) Third, there has to be a diversity of good guys to fit the bad guys closely enough to do some good as the initial front-line assault team. Finally, the system has to actually eliminate the bad guys or we die. All of these factors have to be present at the same time, otherwise the system is useless or

self-destructs. Which one can you eliminate without destroying the whole system? Everything must be in place and working at the same time to do any good at all. This is a tremendous evidence of a designed system. It is not some-



thing which is produced by millions of years of accidents.

This amazing immune system is one of many examples of what Michael Behe (in his book. Darwin's Black Box, calls irreducible complexity. I believe Behe is right in saying that there is no way for such an irreducibly complex system like this to be produced by modifications on a simpler

plan as evolution teaches. (You might want to refer to his book for other examples and a more technical explanation of this topic.) After much research, Behe concludes, "The scientific literature has no answers to the question of the origin of the immune system."

So what is the answer? "In the beginning, God created the heavens and the earth."


