Noah Movie Response

bout the time this T&B will be in your hands, acclaimed director Darren Aronofsky will share with the world his newest movie entitled **Noah** – following the account of the Biblical patriarch. People are abuzz, but WAIT! Be forewarned...there is a lot of controversy surrounding this new movie starring Russell Crowe and numerous Hollywood all-stars. Is this Biblically-based?

Screenwriter Brian Godawa obtained an early copy of the script and warned that Noah is painted as he calls it, an "Environmentalist Wacko." In fact, Aronofsky has said, "It's about environmental apocalypse which is the biggest theme, for me, right now for what's going on on this planet. So I think it's got these big, big themes that connect with us. Noah was the first environmentalist." 1

Paramount Pictures and director Aronofsky have had some divided opinions on the project. Pre-showings of the film to a Jewish group, a group of Christians, and a group of the general public have not shown too favorably.

In studying Ancient Man, it is difficult to determine what life was like before the Flood because the Bible says very little. However, it is clear that the corruption of our world was not primarily an environmental issue, but a spiritual corruption.² Mankind (other than Noah) blatantly ignored the will of God and thus incurred God's judgment.

The account of Noah's ark and the

worldwide flood is about justice and also about grace. God could have destroyed everything, including mankind, yet He saved Noah and his family. This account links with the New Testament teaching that, though no one deserves it on our own, God has prepared a way of salvation from spiritual judgment. Instead of entering through the door of the ark, we are called to enter through Jesus who says of himself, "I am the door; if anyone enters through Me, he will be saved, and will go in and out and find pasture." (John 10:9)

Evidently, Hollywood has certainly gained an interest in the Bible, as many other films have been, or will be, released soon, including: Mark Burnett's **Son of God**, which was adapted from his History Channel series **The Bible**, Steven Spielberg's account of Moses called **Gods and Kings**, and Ridley Scott's account of Moses starring Christian Bale entitled **Exodus**.³

Even if **Noah** or any of these other movies are inaccurate or unbiblical, God can still use them to point people to His Word. It is through hearing God's Word that the Holy Spirit convicts and draws people to Himself and to salvation through faith. (Rom 10:17)

We need to study in order to be prepared to share and give an answer for our faith and to show people that the Bible is the real Truth. Potentially deceiving movies? Yes, but, oh, what an opportunity! This is but one reason that we are excited about our upcoming Discover Creation Training Institute – to train students to take advantage of things like this movie, the recent Ham-Nye debate and other current events to reach people in their community with the truth of God's Word.

Be thinking. Be aware. How can you impact our dark and deceived world with Truth? How will you use these new, popular movies to challenge friends, family, and coworkers to read the Bible and dig into Scripture?

Ark Facts and Quick Answers By Dave Nutting

1. How could all those animals fit on board the Ark?

I remember a student very sarcastically asking this question after a university lecture. I asked him, "How big was the boat?" He said he didn't know. Then I asked, "How many animals had to go on board?" He didn't know that either, but asserted anyway: "They couldn't possibly have fit." Interesting! According to this student, an unknown number of animals couldn't fit on board a boat of unknown size! Hmmmm....

Like many people, this student was suffering from a misconception of the size of the ark. Perhaps he got that idea from skeptical professors or maybe by seeing comic pictures of a tiny boat with elephants and giraffes squeezing on. Unfortunately, even church nurseries and Sunday school classrooms have cute artwork which depict Noah's Ark like that. Couple these impressions with the number of species that exist today, and students end up thinking they couldn't possibly fit.

However, given the size of the Ark described in the Bible (somewhere between 1.5 and 2 times the length of a football field), calculations have shown that there would have been plenty of room for all the land-dwelling, air-breathing kinds (not species) of animals that needed to be on board.

2. How could unskilled people like Noah and his family have built that big boat?

Whoa! Note the assumptions? Who said Noah was unskilled – and even if he was, according to the Bible, he received instructions directly from God. Also, the Bible seems to indicate that Noah had 120 years to build the boat. And who says he and his family did all the work? There is no reason that he could not have hired workers to help. Perhaps he even financed the project by "floating a loan from the skeptics."

3. How could his family have fed and cleaned up after all these animals?

John Woodmorrappe in his book, **Noah's Ark: A Feasibility Study**, has offered some feasible suggestions as to how this could have been accomplished. Also,

perhaps some of the animals went into a state of estivation during this time of stress.

4. How could Noah have collected all those animals?

According to the Bible, God brought the animals to the Ark. (Genesis 6:20)

5. A wooden vessel that big would certainly not be seaworthy.

In his recent debate with Ken Ham, Bill Nye claimed Noah's boat wouldn't hold up since modern shipbuilders had tried to build a large, wooden vessel, but it leaked and eventually sunk. Note the assumption? How do we know that modern shipbuilders know more than Noah? Perhaps he was a better builder and he certainly worked with a much better engineer - God! Besides, as Ken Ham pointed out, there are examples of large wooden vessels in other ancient cultures.

A Global Flood? Really?

any churches and seminaries teach that the Genesis Flood was just a local flood, not a worldwide one. However consider the following Biblical details and language that indicate it certainly was worldwide:

- Need for the Ark: If it was just a local flood, what was the need for the Ark? Animals and people could have migrated to a location of safety.
- Size of the Ark: If it was just a local flood, why was the Ark so large? Besides, calculations have shown that it had ideal dimensions to survive in very rough seas.
- Inclusive language of destruction: The Bible clearly indicates the extent of destruction. Notice the universal language used: "...all that was in the dry land, died. And every living substance was destroyed which was upon the face of the ground, both man, and cattle, and the creeping things, and the fowl of the heaven..." (Gen. 7:22-23 KJV)
- Birds on Ark: Why did the birds need to go on the Ark? If it was just a local flood, they could have easily flown to a place of safety.
- Tops of tallest mountains were covered with water: Water doesn't stack up! If you cover the top of the tallest mountains, you have covered the world.
- The Rainbow: According to Genesis 9:15-17, the rainbow was a sign of God's promise to never again destroy the whole earth with a flood. However, there have been many local floods in recent history. Does God keep his promises?
- **Duration of Flood:** Noah was on the Ark for over a year. That is not reasonable if it was just a local flood.

Was the Hebrew Flood account borrowed from Babylon?

ablets from Babylon show similarities to the biblical account of the Flood. However, their supposed dates range from 2200 to 620 BC, – up to 800 years before Moses wrote Genesis. Does this mean the Hebrews borrowed the Flood account from the Babylonians?

Among a number of versions of the Babylonian flood epics, The **Gilgamesh Epic** is the most complete and most often cited.
Although interesting in its similarity to the biblical text, a comparison of the details leaves little doubt that the Genesis account is the more detailed and more scientifically verifiable. For instance, the dimensions of the Gilgamesh ark describe an

unweildy cube-type structure 6 decks (7 levels) high. It takes Gilgamesh and his workmen about a week to prepare the structure for the duration of the 6 days of the flood – hardly a worldwide catastrophe.

Rather than borrowing from the Babylonians, it is more reasonable to assume that both accounts are predated by the original biblical event that was recorded in oral tradition or in a written form handed down from Noah and the patriarchs to finally be recorded by Moses.
