"After this horrible

beating, Jesus was taken to a hill where He was nailed by His hands and feet to an upright post in the shape of a cross. Six hours later, the Lord Jesus died upon that cross. Once He died, Jesus' body was taken down from the cross and buried in an empty tomb (like a cave) and an enormous stone was rolled in front of the entrance, sealing it shut."

Mrs. Jones paused as Billy began to weep. Hugging him, she comforted him by saying, "I'm sorry, Billy. What was done to Jesus was terrible."

"But why did He have to die?" Billy sobbed. "The Bible tells us in Romans (3:23 & 6:23) that everyone has sinned (disobeyed God) and the punishment for sin is death. Because there is nothing that we can do on our own to get sin


